Implementing a Rhetorical Approach to Grammar in First Year Writing & Rhetoric
University of Colorado Boulder

In this dissertation project, I am leveraging my background in linguistics to implement lessons in rhetorical grammar in my first-year writing courses. To assess student learning with respect to the target learning

goal (increasing student agency to make grammatical choices connected to their writing purposes), I am analyzing classroom discourse, student writing, and student perceptions of their own learning.

Doctoral Researcher 2020-2022

The Social Meaning of Semasiological Variation
University of Colorado Boulder

This research project culminated in my second qualifying paper for my doctoral program. I unified literature that approaches different meanings of the same word (polysemy, or semasiological variation) from cognitive linguistic, sociolinguistic, and linguistic anthropological perspectives. I evaluated previous approaches and developed a new synergistic framework of semasiological variation that takes into account both cognitive and social motivations for semantic extension as well as integrating this type of variation with the notion of social meaning.

The Role of Working Memory in Sentence Planning Strategies in Adults
Language, Development, and Cognition Lab, University of Colorado Boulder

The goal of this project was to determine the factors that affect the choice of different grammatical constructions in sentence planning, including the effect of working memory load. I contributed to the development of stimuli, coordinated online participant intake and consent, ran trials over zoom with participants and managed five other students to collect data. Lastly, I annotated the data in audacity and coded the data for analysis.

This project fulfilled my first qualifying paper for my doctoral program. Using cognitive sociolinguistic methods, I analyzed variation in the use of the word *racist* by tweeters with *blacklivesmatter* vs *maga* in their user descriptions. I developed an annotation scheme involving adjectival grammatical constructions and types of modified phrases, and analyzed several ways that these tweeters construed the concept associated with *racist* differently. This project synergizes work in construction grammar and sociolinguistic variation.
